36,783 pounds of food grown and donated to human service organizations such as the Missoula Food Bank, All Nations Health Center, Mountain Home, and Youth Homes, through 7 farm stands, and a Volunteer for Veggies program at 2 farms.

Expanded our local food distribution network to 13 partners including Lowell School Food Pantry, Missoula Free Fridge, Missoula Head Start and the UM Food Pantry.

"I was in the fields of our CSA farm, the River Road farm, starting when I could walk, planting, weeding, and harvesting alongside my parents and other adults. My childhood is marked by the seasonal rituals of the farm. On onion planting day, the breeze ruffled the seedling tops around me and I can clearly picture my small hands cupping a tender onion seedling, placing it in the soil carefully, tamping the earth around it and repeating the ritual again and again. I not only learned where my food came from, but also how it was grown, how to cook it, pickle, or freeze it. But most importantly I learned how to enjoy it... *My passion has led me to continue to cook, eat,* and think local."
